
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

HISTORY: In 1920 James Robertson, a manager at the Federal Mill, bought a block of land measuring 60' x 122' from Ellen Malony. A timber house was built, owned and occupied by Robertson who was still recorded as its owner/occupier in 1935. 1

VISUAL DESCRIPTION: A three-bay timber gable-roofed Californian Bungalow with an attic. The main gable extends across, minor gables face at right, centre (attic) and at left, behind a flat-roofed verandah. This returns at left and sets back across the right gable as a window head. Upper gables are timbered, with rectangular louvred vents. Lower sections have battered shingles, with concave brackets.

The roof is unglazed Marseilles terra-cotta tiles and the chimney is rougheast, with Voyseyan plate top and pot. Walls are clad in rougheast with dado weatherboards. The verandah has post-pairs extending from unusual shingle panels. Between are palisade and very deep boomerang-shaped fretwork brackets.

SIGNIFICANCE: A characteristic early timber Californian Bungalow built in 1920 for James Robertson, a manager of the Federal Mill. It has local architectural significance as a good representative of its style and historically as embodying life in post-Great War Newtown, and for its association with the manager of the Federal Mill.

INTACTNESS: Good. Windows and front steps have been replaced.

CONDITIONS & THREATS: Very good.
