CITATION

The Bluestone Stables at 327 Shannon Avenue, Newtown, now converted to commercial premises and the original character all but obliterated appear to have insufficient historical associations and lack sufficient architectural integrity to warrant listing on the Geelong Regional Commission Register of Historic Places.

Although the stone has its origins in the foundations and walls of Foster Fyans 'Balyang', on the Barwon River (See Documentation Sheet for Memorial Cairn) the existence of this once historic house is elsewhere recorded.



DESCRIPTION

A coarsed ashlar hip-roofed former stables, with two gables across the site at rear. These gables have a coach entry and oculus over, and two good rainwater heads. Adjacent is a remaining wall from a former neighbouring building. Inside, the roof trusses are exposed. The rear section is separated by a three quarter height masonry wall, and there is a raised section at the rear. The roof is part slate, part iron. There is a brick facade applied in the 1950s with a raked shop front under a beam of a very large span. It has a crazy paving soffit. The adjoining house, no. 325 has an intact cast-iron palisade fence of unusual pattern.





HISTORY

The bluestone stables at 327 Shannon Avenue, Newtown, have great historical significance because of their associations with William Walker's famous omnibus service, which played such an important role in the early history of transport in the Geelong area. Walker was a legendary figure already with his earlier large 1880s stables between Corio Street and Corio Terrace before he came to Newtown in 1895 and built his substantial bluestone stables in Shannon Avenue He was reputed to have used stone from Foster Fyans old house "Balyang" near Princes Bridge in the construction of the Shannon Avenue bus stables have according to Brownhill, "helped to uphold Sunbeam bus which, according to Brownhill, "helped to uphold Newtown hill's superiority in public transport helped to uphold Newtown hill's superiority in public transport All After Walker sold his bus service at the turn of the century, Arthur Nicholls Vines, proprietor of the Cobb and Co. coaching service, briefly ran a bus service from the old Shannon Avenue stables Then, from 1911 until the middle 1920s, Frank Lloyd Hooper, founder

of the Hooper grocery stores, 420 used the building as stabling and a shop. Henry Hooper, grocer, was the owner/occupier in the late 1920s and early 1930s, using the building at first for stabling and then as a store and shop 421 .

The first Newtown rate book entry for Walker's stables in Shannon Avenue (then called West Melbourne Road) was in 1895 when Jane walker (his wife) was listed as the owner and William Walker, bus proprietor, was listed as the occupier of a wooden cottage and bus stables, NAV thirty pounds 22. Jane Walker was owner in that year also of two unfinished brick cottages of eight rooms, also in Shannon Avenue 23. By 1899 William Walker was recorded as the owner of bus stables in Lawrence Street (the earlier name for Leslie Street) and of a storehouse and two shops in West Melbourne Road (Shannon Street)

According to an unpublished Walker family history, 425 Catherine and Thomas Walker and their family lived on a farm on the banks of the Barwon River at Newtown, opposite Queen's Park. Walker, who owned the "horse bus service in Geelong", did well financially "and also married a wealthy wife. He lived in Barwon House near where the boat race starts. It was called Sladen Hall before he bought it, as built by Sir Charles Sladen. Still standing as canteen for woollen mill". 426

There is an account by "The Vagabond", that indefatigueable journalist, in the <u>Geelong Advertiser</u> of 1 June, 1889, of Walker's early Corio Terrace stables, reputedly "the largest of any similar establishment in the colony, fitted up in complete style". The regular bus service provided linked Geelong with Newtown "the aristocratic suburb of Geelong, having a number of fine houses, the buildings and grounds of which would not disgrace Toorak" Walker was also responsible in the 1880s for the construction of the "Academy of Music" building in Corio Street and the adjacent Arcade, which "The Vagabond" claimed would be "the show place of 'new Geelong', which would do credit to the most go ahead of American cities".

When Walker commenced his new bus service in Newtown in 1895, he created another legend by importing to Melbourne from Cardiff a bus he called the Sunbeam in tribute to Lord Brassey, the Governor, on his way to Australia in his steam yacht of that name. According to Brownhill, "There was nothing as good in the other buses as the velvet pile seats provided in the Sunbeam for the comfort of the Newtown passengers" On the first day that the Sunbeam was in service it was drawn by four grey horses, and St. Augustine's

Orphanage Band was taken to town and back, playing music as it went 431 .

Walker continued to run his Shannon Avenue bus service until November 1901432. As we have seen, the bluestone bus stables were used by Arthur Nicholls Vines, coach proprietor, briefly, circa 1909 433, and then Frank Lloyd Hooper, importing grocer, acquired the property, using it as stabling and a shop 434. Henry Hooper, grocer, used the former stables as a store in 1935 435. The building is used currently as an antique shop.

SIGNIFICANCE

These stables have great regional historical significance because of their associations with William Walker's omnibus service, which played such an important role in the early development of transport in the Geelong district. They were constructed in 1895 for Walker, who ran his bus service from there until November 1901. Arthur Nicholls Vines, proprietor of the Cobb and Co. coaching service, briefly ran a bus service from there and from 1911 until the middle 1920s, Frank Lloyd Hooper, founder of the Hooper grocery stores, used the building as stabling and a shop. Henry Hooper, grocer, was the owner in the late 1920s and early 1930s, using the building at first for stabling and then as a store and shop. The building has local architectural significance as a late nineteenth century commercial stone building relatively intact, except lacking the Shannon Avenue front.
