Streetscape

Among the larger villas of the Golf Links Estate, this house adjoins a similarly scaled Old English

style house and a more modest Mediterranean type to the east.

Significance

Architecturally, a successfully designed, prominent and near intact example of a common suburban style which is enhanced by its landscape and contributes to a notable precinct: of regional importance.

Historically, its owner is typical of the classes who first occupied the estate and its builder, the creator of much of its character: of local importance.

History

One P. Hancock appears to have speculatively built this six room brick house, in 1933, at an estimated cost of £1,4751. Mrs. M.R. Costello was the first occupier listed by the Victorian Directory. A Clarence Hancock lived at 1 Finsbury Way which was constructed in the same period, on the Golf Links Estate³. A later owner of 4 Finsbury was A.J. Hopkins*.

Description

In the Old English manner, perhaps via the Voysey influence rather than straight neo-Tudor, the house still possesses the style's broad gables but with wave-pattern shingling rather than framed half-timbering. Clinker brick trim contrasts with the textured stucco but complements the roof tiles. A rough-adzed dark stained timber portal provides the entrance porch. The fence and general planting character are original.

Comparative Examples

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External Integrity

An addition appears to have been made over the garage and a pergola added to the north elevations; alterations to glazing have occurred.

Streetscape

A major corner element to this more substantial part of the Golf Links Estate.

Significance

Architecturally, an unusual but altered adaptation of the popular Old English manner which contributes to the important Golf Links Estate: of local importance.

Historically, little is known of the first owner in the Camberwell context.

History

Camberwell builder-designer, J.L.E. Humphries, constructed (and designed) this house for another contractor, Clyde A. Forbes, in 1938¹. The cost was estimated at £2,400 and the area was over 27 squares, distributed across two levels².

Description

Of cream brick with curves, open terraces and corner, steel framed windows, this house is both Moderne in style and of typical of Humphries' work. His favoured glazed manganese bricks are used sparingly here, confined to the front fence, but the massing of curved and cuboid forms is highly successful, if not modern.

The garden suites the period.
