IR Warren to build this house in 1935<sup>1</sup>. By 1939 he had added to the house and altered the first floor2.

# Description

A neo-Tudor or Old English style house of clinker brick, dark stained 'half timbering', diamond-pane glazing and an unusual, probably former garage which has since been sympathetically glazed in. The fence and hedge suit the period.

# Description

Old English or neo-Tudor in style. The house possesses an interesting mixture of gabled and hipped roof forms which are jointed by stylized pediments or triangular brick patterns over the main window groups. Clinker and tapestry brickwork provide the desired Medieval roughness of texture, both in the walls, the Tudoresque fence, and the colour-blended Marseilles pattern tiles lend the equivalent effect to the roof cladding. Part of the planting is sympathetic to the period.

#### History

Percy L. Rowsell, a photographer, and his wife, Lillian, were the owner-occupiers of this six room brick house when C.J. Smith built it in 1935, and remained there until at least the 1960s<sup>1</sup>. The estimated cost was £1300<sup>2</sup>.
