History

Henry W. Bannister purchased allotment 48 in Moorhouse Street from J. Brown and had architect A E Carleton design a pair of houses for the site. However, he only had one brick dwelling built on the allotment, in 1890 (28).² An importer, Bannister occupied the 9-roomed dwelling some of the time, but rented it to William Branton in 1899 and W.A. Wiseman in 1904.3 In 1903 he subdivided the land and had another house built on the subdivision. The 7-roomed, two-storeyed brick dwelling built by F.J. Austin had an area of 2776 square feet.

Bannister named 26 Moorhouse Street 'Palmerston' and 28 Moorhouse Street 'Rathgar' and rented Palmerston to Herbert Salmon, a valuer. 6 In 1907, Mrs. Bridget Flynn occupied Palmerston and resided there until after 1910. Occupancy of the two houses changed frequently after 1915 and by 1935 they had been converted into flats.

Description

A gabled two-storey pair with timber turned-post verandahs extending two levels, segment-arched friezes and heavy timber brackets supporting the half-timbered gables above. Brickwork is tuck-pointed and intermixed with red rubbed voussoirs, combining with cemented architraves and sill mouldings. Glazing has

coloured glass borders and perhaps the only indication of the difference in construction date of the two lies in the glass pattern of 28 being of the Jacobeathan mode of the 1890s, in contrast to the curvilinear Art Nouveau oriented leaded glass in The verandah balustrading is turned and pierced timber executed in an intricate spindle and frieze pattern, while the lower verandah frieze is a serpentine fretted pattern intermixed with a fretted trefoil motif from medieval sources. The frontage of No. 26 is noticeably wider than No. 28, but this does not disrupt the asymmetry of the pair.

External Integrity

Fence has been removed. New paving has been carried out around the frontage and carport added to No. 26 which, unlike No. 28, is set back from the side boundary.

Significance

Architecturally, a distinctive house form for the metropolitan area, particularly Camberwell where row house construction was seldom used. It combines the emerging Medieval inspired stylism with the row form which had previously depended on classical sources for its external expression. Its staged construction is also of interest given the subtle differences between the houses as a reflection of the era in which each was built. It also contributes to a late 19th early 20th century precinct: of regional importance.

Historically, of local interest because of process of flat conversion in the 1930s.

History

Master builder, L.W. Ritter designed and built this two-storey brick house of seven rooms for George Centennial Dummett, a manufacturer, in 1939¹. The house was estimated to cost £2,000². George and Mabel J. Dummett owned and occupied this property from the time it was built until the late 1940s³. By 1952 Miss Lorna Hood was the

owner-occupier of this property and remained here until at least 19744.

Description

A two-storey stucco and tapestry brick house in the streamlined Moderne style with curved and square corners, steel-framed windows and decorative wrought-iron in balustrades and fence panels. Roofing is glazed terra-cotta tiles and the rendered chimney is stepped in the manner of the 'waterfall' plan form. Landscape is of the period.

Drawings show the original ground floor layout as hall, lounge, den and stairs, with the dining area opening from the lounge and to the kitchen, in turn. Upstairs there were three bedrooms and a sun deck, unfortunately facing south.
