HISTORY

This building may date from the 1850's as it appears to be on Taylor's 1854 map.

DESCRIPTION

The single storey brick building has a hipped roof clad in slate. There are red brick chimneys projecting from the 'M' shaped roof and a rear extension built of timber. The Regency style verandah with its delicate timber decoration is unusual in Geelong West.

SIGNIFICANCE

109 Clarence Street may date from the 1850's. The form of the building is common for the period, however the verandah and its decoration are noteworthy. It is of local significance.

POLICY/RECOMMENDATIONS

G.R.P.S.

Removal of the paint on the brickwork and a more appropriate fence and gates would greatly enhance the character of the building.
