ANZ BANK - 9 LYDIARD STREET NORTH

BUILDING ANALYSIS AND DESCRIPTION

This bank was constructed for the Colonial Bank in 1860 to the design of Architect Leonard Terry. The contractor was Messrs.Boynton and Conway. Separate tenders were called for the fitting out of the bank on the 4th September 1860. In 1918, the Colonial Bank amalgamated with the National Bank; since there was already a branch of this bank next door, the bank was sold to the London Chartered Bank on the 11th November 1919.

In 1921 the London Chartered Bank amalgamated with the E.S. & A. Bank, which amalgamated with the ANZ Bank in November 1970.

This building is a more sophisticated composition than the other three banks in this group. The composition has two pavilions flanking a slightly recessed three bay collonade, the ground floor of Roman Doric, the upper floor in Corinthian. In each case the effect of the collonade is minimised by the placing of windows between the columns which appear to be original. The window guard motif in the upper colonnade is brought out in the Italianate balconettes to the pavilion windows.

The whole composition is surmounted by a dentillated cornice and balustraded parapet.

The use of the pavilion to provide variety to the facade is also seen in Terry's E.S. & A. Bank, 9 Malop Street, Geelong, also constructed in 1860 by contractors Boynton & Conway.

An early photo survives of this bank dated c.1861, and shows the original windows (with iron window grills) and the original entrance.

ANZ BANK - 9 LYDIARD STREET NORTH BUILDING ANALYSIS AND DESCRIPTION (contd.)

The interior has been completely altered with only one cast iron column remaining.

In 1919 a permit was obtained for the addition of a verandah and balcony to the design of Clegg and Miller Architects. It appears that this scheme was never undertaken.

This bank forms part of a group of four banks designed by Leonard Terry which forms a unique corner streetscape element to the Sturt Street/Lydiard Street precincts. It is in good condition and is intact externally, apart from the alteration to the door on the left hand side, the inappropriate sign, and the painting of the original cement render finish.
