BUILDING CITATION

This bluestone warehouse, constructed in 1862 for Holmes White & Co. appears to have been designed by Architect, Charles Webb. A parapet has been added to the original facade altering the balanced proportion of the original elevation. The interior, consisting of a basement and two upper floors, is substantially intact, and provides an excellent example of timber warehouse construction. On the ground floor, massive square timber columns and brackets carry the floor structure. Bull nose stone corbels support the beams at the wall.

This warehouse is a very pleasing two storied rusticated building. It is in good condition and is relatively intact. Unlike Pratt's warehouse, it is not detached, but provides an important infill building to Lydiard Street. The intact external detailing and excellent internal timber construction combine to make this a building of importance. It provides a strong streetscape element.

RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that this building be added to the Historic Buildings Register, the Register of the National Estate, and be specified under Clause 8 of the Town and Country Planning Act (Third Schedule).

J.J. GOLLER & CO., - 114 LYDIARD STREET NORTH BUILDING ANALYSIS AND DESCRIPTION

This warehouse constructed in 1862 for Holmes White & Co. 1 appears to have been designed by Architect, Charles Webb. 2 By 1876 the building had passed to the present owners. 3

The original facade, constructed in bluestone, is visible in an early photo. A parapet has subsequently been added, somewhat altering the balanced proportion of the original elevation.

The facade is a very pleasing two stories composition. The upper floor openings are surrounded by rough dressed quoining and flat lintel voussoirs with slightly cropped keystones. The central window is tripled to make up the width of the entrance bay. On the ground floor a broad entrance doorway with a segmental head is similarly dressed. Quoin stones link together to effectively form 5 bands of rustication across the facade.

The interior is substantially intact. On the ground floor, massive square timber columns measuring a quarter metre square (with equally square brackets) carry the timber floor structure. Bull nose stone corbels support the beams at the wall. This interior provides an excellent example of an intact timber warehouse construction.
