BUILDING CITATION

This building was originally constructed as a one storey office for A.L.Lynn, but was extended to its present form in 1898 by Clegg, Kell & Miller, Architects.

The present facade is intact, apart from minor alterations. It is a conservative composition for the 1890's with refined pilasters, dentillations, and a small balustraded pediment with three flamboyant, almost Chinese, urns. The central one is raised on a block plinth flanked by Queen Anne Scrolls. The tabernacle section to the upper floor with a diagonal name plate is the most eclectic part of the composition.

Internally there is little of note apart from the elegant staircase. This building is of major architectural significance. The facade is an intact restrained composition of the 1890's with delicate eclectic detailing. The elaborate urns are unique and introduce an unusual oriental element The building is in good condition and provides an important to the design. element to a significant streetscape sequence in the Lydiard Street precinct. RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that this building be added to the Historic Buildings Register, the Register of the National Estate, and be specified under Clause 8 of the Town and Country Planning Act (Third Schedule).

COUNSEL CHAMBERS - 26 LYDAIRD STREET SOUTH BUILDING ANALYSIS AND DEXCRIPTION

This building was originally constructed as one storey in c.1870¹. It was builty for A.L. Lynn, who commenced practise as the first solicitor in Ballarat in May 1853², and formerly occupied an iron office in Lydiard Street, probably on this site. In 1898, Architects Clegg, Kell and Miller extended the building to two storeys and provided a new and imposing street facade.

The present facade is intact, apart from minor alterations such as the ground floor windows and doors, and the facade paintwork. It is primarily a Renaissance revival composition, a conservative design for the 1890's, with a ground floor of unfluted conic pilasters overlaid on a pier and arch system of three openings. A refined entablature with dentillations separates the upper floor which has partially fluted Corinthian pilasters and two arched windows flanking, in the central bay, a tabernacle section with an unusual diagonal date plate, with graphic elements popular for the period. Above this is a neat dentillated cornice and small balustraded pediment with three delightfully flamboyant, almost Chinese, urns; the central one raised on a block plinth flanked by Queen Anne Scrolls.

Internally, there is little of note apart from the elegant stair which has a continuous relatively intact handrail with an elaborate pine cone ornament to the newel posts.

This building is of major architectural significance. The facade is an intact restrained and unique composition of the late 1890's with delicate, eclectic detailing. The elaborate urns are quite unique and introduce an unusual oriental feeling to the composition. The building is in good condition and provides an important element to a significant streetscape sequence in the Lydiard Street precinct.
