HISTORY: Probably built about 1875(?).1

VISUAL DESCRIPTION: A double-fronted, bichromatic Italianate cottage, set back, with a slate hip-roof. At right, is a wing-wall and the left bay is set forward with an unusually shallow bullnosed verandah in the angle. This has a cast-iron lace valence, brackets and Composite posts and end corbels, with the maker's name-plate. The house is bichromatic brick: dark brown with cream dressings, tuck-pointed. The verandah has encaustic geometric tiles, with bluestone edging. There is a copper name-plate. There are timber eaves brackets and the wing-wall corbel has a rosette over a scroll bracket. There is a timber shoe-box on the verandah. Three chimneys have deep unpainted render moulds with dividers decorated with acroteria. There is a rare timber capped corrugated iron fence, capped timber posts and two rare dowel palisade gates, with concave top rails, an early letter-box and lattice side screen.

<u>COMPARATIVE ANALYSIS</u>: Comparable to: 203 Coppin Street (ref: 71) and 37 Somerset Street (ref: 144).

<u>SIGNIFICANCE</u>: A particularly intact, characteristic double-fronted bichromatic Italianate cottage of about 1875, with a rare surviving fence system. It is of local architectural significance.

INTACTNESS: Excellent. The rear chimney has lost its front divider, lower gate sections have been clad and the left fence-post lacks its cap. Cream bricks are generally painted cream (except chimneys). It has a security door. The colour scheme may be original.

**CONDITION & THREATS:** Very good. Slates may need some repair.
