HISTORY

It appears that a two room brick dwelling was located on this site as early as 1852. James Meek was the occupier of this building and the larger building which appears to have replaced it about 1860. James Meek was a carpenter-turned-shopkeeper who lived there until his death in 1872. A building on this site was at one time referred to as a brick shop and three rooms.

DESCRIPTION

It is a simple single storey brick cottage which has a central front door and a double-hung window on either side. Brick voussoirs can be seen above the slightly arched window and door heads. These heads are at different heights and this is unusual. The hipped roof is clad in corrugated iron. There is no evidence of a former shop front on the existing front elevation.

SIGNIFICANCE

30 Weller Street is one of the few extant examples of a typical brick cottage, in Geelong West, from about the middle of the nineteenth century. It is of local significance.

POLICY/RECOMMENDATIONS

G.R.P.S.

Removal of the paint from the brickwork by an approved method would greatly enhance the character of this building.
