

CITATION

Solomon's Buildings, erected on the historic Geelong Market Square site in 1912-13, for Julius Solomon is the finest work of early 20th century architects, Tombs and Durran. Arranged as a series of bays and bow windows in a two-storey composition of striated brick, the building is defined by domed pavilions at each end of the Moorabool Street facade. The establishment is a noted Geelong emporium and a familiar central city landmark. The original character of the facade is diminished with the painting out of the red brick contrasts, and the complete renovation in the Market Square Project in 1985-86.
