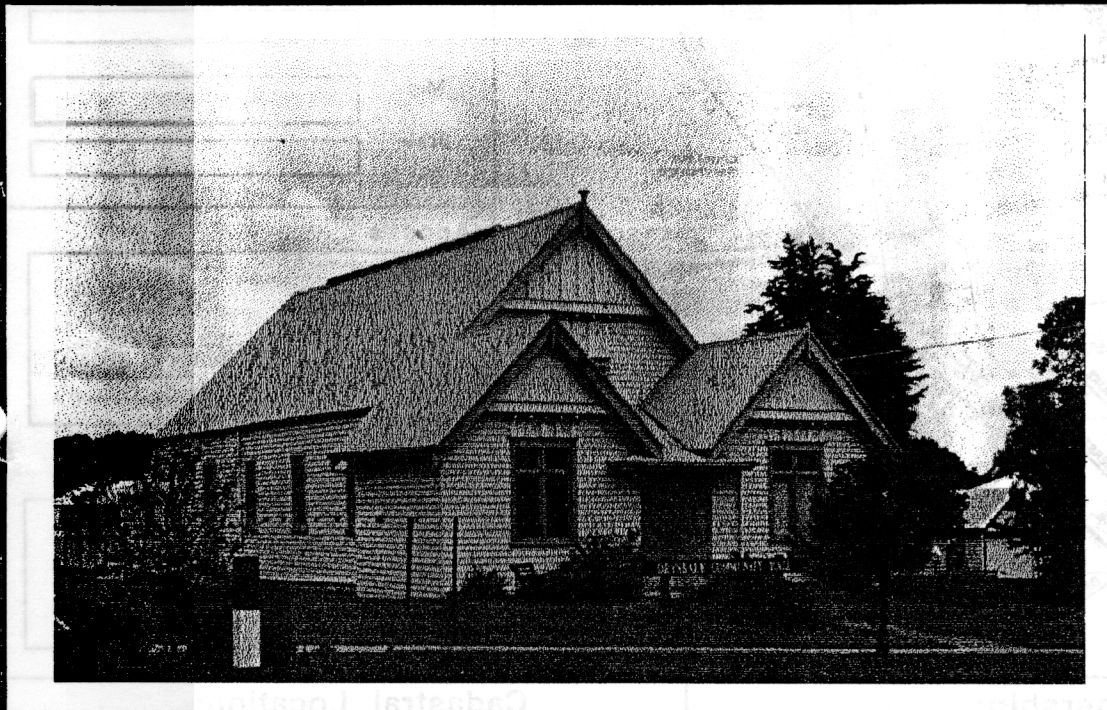

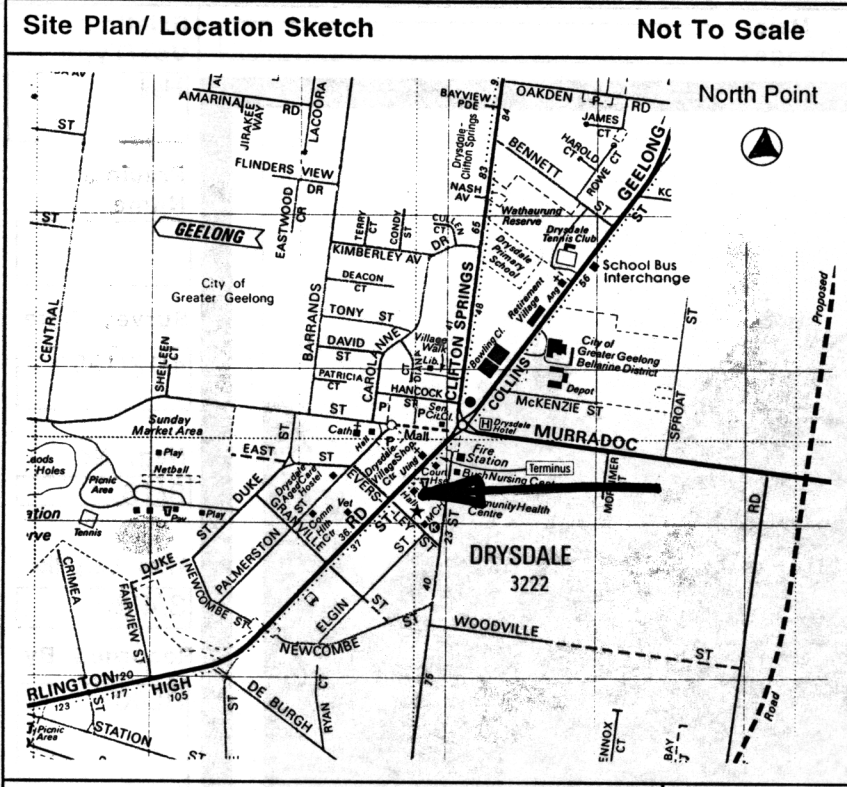

History of Site/Object/Place:

This building was formerly the Methodist Sunday School which was believed to have been built in approximately 1910 after the local community had raised money over many years for its construction. It is currently used as the Drysdale Community Hall.(1)

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Statement of Cultural Significance:

The Drysdale Community Hall was originally the Methodist Sunday School and was built by public donation c1910. It is a gable roof weatherboard building with timber decoration and original window and door openings.

The Drysdale Community Hall has historic and social value to the Drysdale community.

The Drysdale Community Hall is substantially intact with original structural form. It has been used continuously for most of the nineteenth and the twentieth century by the local community firstly for religious and subsequently for cultural activities, and is therefore a place of particular importance to the area.

It is of **LOCAL** cultural significance.
