37 HAWTHORN GROVE

G. Gillespie was the first owner from 1892-1915 of this single storey villa, which had a number of notable tenants. C. Varley, printer, occupied 37 Hawthorn Grove in 1900. R. McComas, wool merchant, was there in 1905, and H. Massing, grazier, in the 1920s. By the late 1970s, the 1892 house was being let as apartments. Possibly by the architect Prockter who designed the adjoining residence in 1893. This building illustrates the gradual transition from Victorian period villas to the Queen Anne domestic style.
