History

The Cam family of Oxley Road bought three blocks of land in Hawthorn Grove on which they had four houses built as investments. They were Nos. 48 (2896), 50 (1891), 52 (1891-92) and 54 (1898). "Cranbourne" at No. 52 has some architectural distinction for the segmental pediment in its verandah with cast-iron ornamental infill. 159 Its occupiers included J. Dyer (1892), D. Carnegie (1896) and Arthur Lock, chemist (1910). By the late 1970s, it had been converted into apartments.

Unusual verandah and substantially intact. A home typical of the 1880s.

Significance

"Cranbourne" has historical significance because of its associations with the Cam dairy family of Oxley Road, who built four houses in Hawthorn Grove as investments. It has significance also, as an example of the comfortable villas in garden settings built as investments by wealthy local business and professional men in middle-class suburban Hawthorn.
