History

Recorded as a brick house "not quite finished" in 1890, No. 5 was built for George Gillespie, corn merchant, as an investment. Gillespie lived next door at "Roseburn", a substantial two-storeyed residence built for him in 1883-84. Gillespie owned a number of properties in Hawthorn from the early 1870s including a house off Power Street (1873) and a house and land in Auburn Road. By 1880 he had owned and sold houses and land in Weinburg, Lisson, Tooronga, Glenferrie and Auburn Roads.

By 1892, the single storey villa at No. 5 Kinkora Road was occupied by Nomens and Sheils (or Scheiles) and was described in the Hawthorn rate book as a brick house of eight rooms (NAV 80 pounds). By 1893-94 Augustus Nomens and Christian Scheiles, gentlemen, had become owners/occupiers. Mrs. Tredgold Strong lived at No. 5 in the late 1890s and Edward Gray was there in 1918-19.6
