#### "KINKORA"

#### History

The second home of Patrick O'Brien, Hawthorn pioneer, survives at 17 Kinkora Road. Described in the 1877 Hawthorn valuation book as an eleven-roomed brick house unoccupied and unfinished, the house was listed as a twelve-roomed house by 1882.<sup>17</sup> Yet another house owned by O'Brien was occupied by George Gillespie, a miller and corn merchant, in the early 1880s.<sup>18</sup> This is known now as 7 Kinkora Road.

By 1884-85 Patrick O'Brien, gentleman, was listed as the owner and occupier of house and land in Kinkora road, and a second house and land in the same street occupied by Thomas Maidment, gentleman.<sup>19</sup> Later, Mrs. Patrick O'Brien became the owner of both properties.<sup>20</sup> She was at No. 17 still in 1907.<sup>21</sup>

A new owner of No. 17, John Kincaid, was recorded in 1912-13.<sup>22</sup> It was noted in that year that Kincaid bought the block "with residence and stable" for 1400 pounds.<sup>23</sup> Kincaid owned No. 17 until abut 1923-24 when it was described as a brick house of eleven rooms.<sup>24</sup> From about 1927 until the 1930s, it was the home of Elizabeth Vial.<sup>25</sup>

In January 1853 one of the principal landholders in the Kinkora Road region, John McAley, advertised his suburban villa with orchard, land, cottage, barn, stables and garden; and 4 acre lots on the main road (Barkers?) with extensive view of shipping and surrounding country, quarter of an hours drive to Town.<sup>26</sup>

In 1854 the second landholder Hague, decided to sell his block, subdivided into allotments of about one acre with access from the newly created Kinkora Road. But Hagues land was bought in large parcels by Patrick O'Brien and McAley's land by Daniel Meaney and so the road was not put through at that time. O'Briens property was not subdivided until the late 1888 when 38 lots were advertised with a covenant to build within 5 years, on not less than 40ft

allotments and for not less than 650 pounds.<sup>27</sup> The changing road widths in Kinkora Road indicate the various subdivisions times by the different landowners.

"By coincidence, both the Johnson and Meaney properties were ready for subdivision at the beginning of the eighties. The extension of the railway line from Hawthorn to Camberwell was accompanied by land subdivision and speculative land buying and house building in streets close to the new stations, and houses were also built in the Hawthorn Grove near Glenferrie Road soon after the Johnson blocks were sold in 1882 (from about \$200 to \$400 each). The Meaney estate was in Thomas Kelly's name, and some blocks were transferred out of the title during 1881-82".<sup>28</sup>

#### Description

A mansion house of atypical form, reflecting its probable 1870s date. The principal facade faces the side garden with a ground level bay window. Entry is gained to the house via one of the two flanking short side verandahs. Between these cast iron verandahs, the house projects in a separate wing to present a classically detailed facade with hood moulds, architraves and bracketed sills. The house has clearly been restored in recent times, and the extent of alteration and/or conjectural restoration is not clear.

The garden provides a complementary setting.

#### Assessment

There are clearly some alterations here which make assessment difficult. The architect for the house has not been attributed, however, quite clearly its unusual form indicates a designer at work. Its significance is primarily historical however for its association with O'Brien and the subdivision of the Kinkora Road area for the creation of a Victorian Garden suburb.

#### Significance

#### Metropolitan

- 1. Historically significant as the home of O'Brien, his second "Kinkora", and for the association with the subdivision of Kinkora Road for a garden suburb.
- 2. Architecturally significant for the contribution to the precinct.
