Built in 1907 for Paul Wischer, 3 Linda Cres. was described as a brick house of nine rooms in the 1908 Hawthorn rate book.  $^5$  It was listed as "Ayr" in 1910 and occupied by a Mrs. Brown in the 1930s. It became the Loloma Guest House in 1949 and apartments in 1959.  $^6$
