History

Frederick Dodgshun, warehouseman, was the first owner and occupier of this brick residence in 1891, when it was described as a brick house of eight rooms, NAV 80 pounds. ²⁰ By 1896, when Dodgshun was owner/occupier still, its valuation had dropped to 50 pounds, a sign of the depressed conditions of the time. ²¹ By that date William Dodgshun owned the brick residence at 16 Lyndhurst Cres., a six-roomed brick house occupied by Mrs. J.T. Smith with the even lower valuation of 34 pounds. ²²

Substantially intact, and an excellent example of medium size garden villas for the late 1880s and early 1890s.
