29 SHAKESPEARE GROVE

History

David Card, jeweller, was the owner in 1885 of vacant land, NAV 25 pounds, in Shakespeare Grove, 11 the future site of No. 29. The following year, a house owned and occupied by Card, with an NAV of 120 pounds, was recorded in the Hawthorn rate books. 12 In 1887, this building was identified as a house of ten rooms, NAV 125 pounds. 13 David Card, jeweller, was the owner/occupier still in 1889 when the NAV had fallen to 80 pounds, 14 equal to the valuation on Archibald Davidson's houses at 23-27 Shakespeare Grove.
