

Astolat, 630 Riversdale Road

History

A typical large Italianate villa of the period, Astolat's first occupiers appear to have been far from the ordinary. Its first owner- occupier Thomas Plumley Derham, was junior to his better known industrialist brother, Frederick but suffered the same indignities at the 1893 bank moratorium⁶. Both were involved in the subsequent 'secret composition' and Thomas's house and four acre grounds went to a new owner, engineer Michael Spencer, in 1895⁷. Dugold Little followed in 1898 and early this century, the Trustees Executors and Agency Co leased it to William Reilly⁸.

James Martyn, an iron founder, owned Astolat soon after; his widow Lucy Martyn occupying the house, on its reduced allotment of 152 x 531 feet. Astolat was converted to flats by the 1930's².

In the brief period the Derhams occupied Astolat, Thomas's financial career peeked and troughed but the future Major

Generals Francis and Alfred Derham were either infants or, in Alfred's case probably born at the house during this period. Alfred, a doctor, and Francis a solicitor in the wake of his father, both

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gained military honours during World War I, Alfred serving as Assistant Director of the 8th Division AIF Medical Service and Francis receive the DSO and *Croix de Guerre*. Francis became a director of G J Coles and Co, McEwans Ltd., the Metropolitan Gas Co and Rocke Tompsitt and Co Pty. Ltd.

Both boys and their similarly distinguished sister, Enid, were infants during the brief period at Astolat and hence little light is shed on their subsequently successful careers by the house.

Peter Watts reconnaissance of Victoria's historic gardens describes these grounds as extensive with well planted beds and a superb setting for the house. Mature specimens of Kauri, Bunya Bunya, Silky Oaks and the more typical English Oaks create an exotic skyline unrivaled elsewhere in the city. The tennis court and early pavilion building compliment the remarkable survival of a typical large suburban house of the 19th century still set in extensive grounds and served by its leisure facilities.

Its association with the Derham family apart, the house has significance for its long history of occupancy by leaders of Melbourne society. Its conversion to flats in the 1930s marks an historically important transition.

Description

The house is virtually as it was at its construction albeit a typical villa type (see a similar single storeyed house at 19 Mangarra Road, and two storeyed at 7 Victoria Avenue, 10 Trafalgar Road and 3 Fermanagh Road). The carriage sweep garden and its accompanying pavilion distinguish this house among its peers, illustrating well the comfortable home life of its era. A cast iron two-level verandah and cement detail are typical of the type.

The picket fence has been replaced in a slightly different pattern.

Streetscape

Unrelated to the nearby villas in Riversdale Road but perceivable, together with its western neighbour, as presubdivision properties: the garden and fence (replaced) contribute a sense of period at the street alignment.

Significance

Architecturally, a large and externally near intact (?) example of a common 19th Century villa style which is greatly enhanced by its exotic and ornamental landscape setting; of regional importance.

Historically, linked briefly with the Derham family but, as the first owners, very expressive of the tastes and expectations of their like both in choice of garden and home; of local importance and regional interest.
