Statement of Significance

11 Barrington Avenue is a fine example of a symmetrical, attic storeyed Federation villa. Largely intact, its notable elements include an arched central porch of moulded red bricks, the segmental bay windows which flank it and the attic storey gable which protrudes above. Important details include leadlights, the Marseilles tiles, ridge tiles, finials and chimneys of the roof and the front fence and gate.
