Statement of Significance

The terrace of six single storey houses at 123-133 Wellington Street is an unusually externally intact example of this common late Victorian housing type. Of polychrome brick, with an ornate rendered parapet, the group retains original features such as window and door joinery, cast iron fences, front verandahs, and decorative stucco ornament to the wing walls. Most houses also retain the original verandah tiles.
