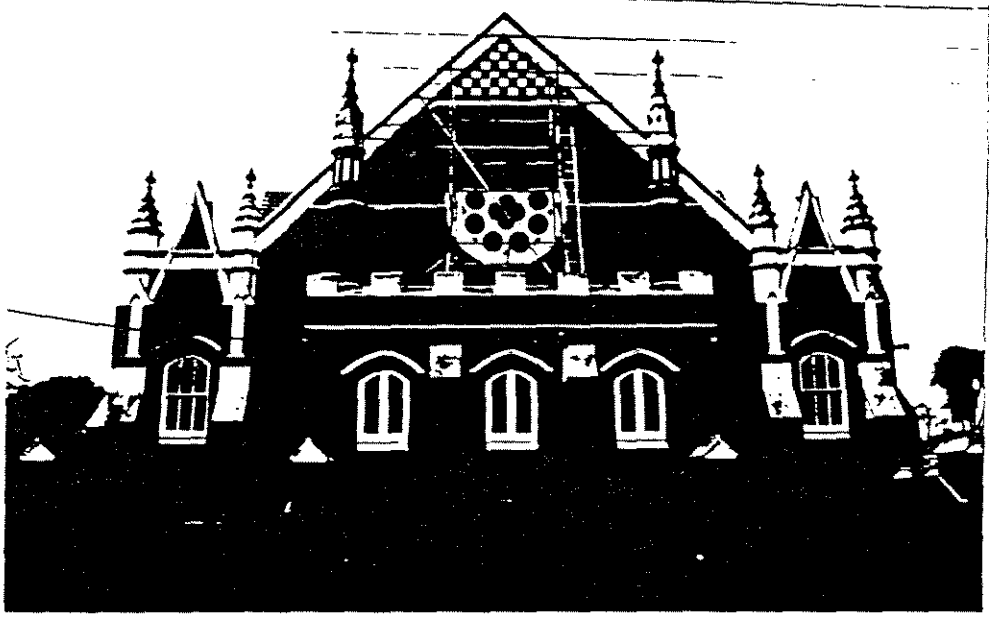

Statement of Significance

Founded in 1922, the present Kew Baptist Church is a notable if somewhat simplified version of the English Perpendicular Revival popular in the Interwar period. Integral to the style are the shallow arched windows, the encrusted finials of the spirelets, the crenellated parapet of the narthex and the chequerboard pattern of the gable. Also integral to the original conception are the leadlights, the joinery of windows and doors, the rose window of the west end. The building is largely intact.
