

Statement of Signficance

Chesterton, which comprises four flats, is a large example of the interwar Tudor Revival at its most stylised. Specific Tudor elements such as high splayed chimneys, brick nogging, four centred arches and halftimbering are incorporated are scattered across the building in a rather free fashion. The walls of the ground fllor are of red brick, while the first floor is rough rendered with clinker bricks around openings and for decorative relief. A sun room projects on the ground floor, north side. The garden and fence are original and integral to the significance of the site.
