Statement of Significance

21 Barry Street is significant as a distinctively detailed two storey Federation villa. Notable elements include the tuckpointed red brick walls, the curved half-timbering of the gable, strapwork around the circular window of the first floor and under other windows, the unusual front verandah with carved timber posts and a bullnose iron roof and the dominant brick chimneys, one of which has 'blood and bone' banding of brick and render. There is also a large bay window on the first floor. The entry porch on the south side and the door and window joinery are largely intact.

Comments

The front verandah has been enclosed and used as a bathroom, but now appears to be undergoing reconstruction.
