BUILDING CITATION

This building constructed in 1863 to the design of Leonard Terry, Architect, is th only gold fields branch of this bank that has traded continuously up to the present day.

The ground floor is rusticated, and the circular lights above the door and window transomes (used only on this bank in Ballarat) are an elegant reflection of the shape of the arcading. The whole composition is surmounted by a prominent cornice, and despite the extra height of this building, it blends well with the two banks on either side.

The building forms part of an important streetscape of four Leonard Terry banks. The grouping of these buildings is unique to the State of Victoria. The extra height of the National Bank, provides a variety of scale to the streetscape. The building is in good condition. Apart from the unsympathetic green-grey paint colour which disrupts the continuity of the streetscape, the alteration to the door (now a window) and the new entrance door, this building is externally intact. The interior has been altered. RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that this building be added to the Historic Buildings Register, the Register of the National Estate, and be specified under Clause 8 of the Town and Country Planning Act (Third Schedule).

#### NATIONAL BANK - 5 LYDIARD STREET NORTH

### BUILDING ANALYSIS AND DESCRIPTION

A branch of this bank was opened on February 16, 1859, and it was the first of many branches opened in the gold fields. It is the only one that has traded continuously up to the present day.

Tenders were called on December 24th, 1861, 2 and again on August 28th, 1862, by Architect Leonard Terry. On November 13th, 1862 tenders were called for fittings. No original drawings of the building survive but a plan is recorded in the original premises book.5

The ground floor is rusticated, and a plinth course cuts through the architraves to meet the window guards in a similar fashion to the Bank of New South Wales, 13-15 Lydiard Street. The circular lights above the door and left hand window transomes are an elegant reflection of the shape of the arcading. The window to the left was originally a door.

The first floor windows are surmounted by hoods supported on consoles; the upper floor is treated at a reduced scale, but with hooded instead of attic windows. The whole composition is surmounted by a prominent cornice, and despite the extra height, the design compliments the other Terry bank buildings on either side.

# NATIONAL BANK - 5 LYDIARD STREET NORTH BUILDING ANALYSIS AND DESCRIPTION

This building forms part of an important streetscape of four Leonard Terry banks. This grouping of buildings is unique to the State of Victoria. The added height of the National Bank provides a diversity of scale to this group. Apart from the unsympathetic green-grey paint colour, the alteration to the left hand door, (now a window), and the new entrance doors, the building is intact externally. It has been altered internally.
