land, and erected it in 1820, on a site which a large portion of it still occupies in Jolimont, which must, in those far-off days, have been an ideal suburban hillside. Captain Lonsdale's house was also in Jolimont, near to the site afterwards occupied by an orderly-room. It is still in existence at Carrum, where it forms a week-end retreat for Mr. Maclean, of the Ports and Harbours department.

The original palace, which has sometimes been confused with the original Government-house, stood on the north-east corner of the Jolimont land, on the site now occupied by the mansion of Mr. Sharp. Jolimont must, in those days, surely have been the fashionable quarter.

Mr. La Trobe lived to become Lieutenant-Governor of Victoria on separation, but Sir Charles Hotham (his successor), was the first occupant of the Toorak house, which, after the present house was built, was bought by Mrs. Johnson. A year or so ago the land was cut up in allotments and sold at auction.

The first civic functionary and Government representative (Captain Lonsdale), arrived in the *Rattlesnake*, from Sydney, on 18th 1838, and occupied the
