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The grantee for this allotment was James Griston, a miner, in 1864. He married Agnes Aughterson, in 1857, and commenced a family of six with the twins, John and Elizabeth, in 1858.

BENDIGO & EAGLEHAWK HERITAGE STUDY-SIGNIFICANT SITES GRAEME BUTLER & ASSOCIATES James died in 1876, aged 50.¹ Like Lisle, Griston was at Golden Square for a long period and from an early date. He owned property in Panton Street during the early 1860s, prior to his first listing as an owner-occupier on the Sheepshead Reef line in 1863.² Griston continued to own other properties, including a tenanted house in Rowan Street during the 1870s, up until his death. Agnes Griston then became the listed owner of this and his other properties and, after her, Emma Griston, a spinster, in the late 1890s.³ More recently, Walter Randall (also a miner) owned it.⁴

Description

This is a double-fronted weatherboard-clad house, with a gabled main roof and convex-profile verandah. Apart from the verandah detailing, the house has merely typical early architraves to openings and face-brick chimneys, with corbelled tops, exposed on the side of the house. The timber verandah supports, however, are not typical among surviving early verandahs. Each is panelled with a quatrefoil piercing in the top and bottom panels, and diamond or trellis pattern borders to the mid-panel, with connecting vertical slats. Scalloped friezes and brackets link each support. The whole verandah detailing has a Gothic Revival character about it, but this, it appears, is not so for the house which, nevertheless, may have had scalloped gable fascias (obscured from the street view).

External Integrity

The house appears near original.

Context

Sited in a semi-rural landscape, between Golden and Poverty Gullies, the house is one of a small group associated with the important mining activity in the area.

Landscape

Garden of more recent origin with roses lining path to the entrance door.Mature shrubs are in the outer garden area.

Significance

Architecturally, the panelled verandah supports and detailing represent an early form of detailing which has not survived in quantity in the State. It also forms a valuable part of a house group linked by proximity and ownership with the rich Golden Gully gold field.

Historically, its long association with miners complements the adjoining goldfield's significance.
