**HISTORY:** Land owned by Ebenezer Hendy was purchased in 1926 by John and Nancy Tinney who built this house.<sup>1</sup>

VISUAL DESCRIPTION: A red brick double-fronted Californian Bungalow with a broad gable-roof facing. This is clad with Marseilles pattern, unglazed terra-cotta tiles, finials, and chimney-pots. A minor gable projects at left, with a canted bay window, with leadlight upper sashes.

COMPARATIVE ANALYSIS: Numbers 20, 21, etc.

SIGNIFICANCE: A brick Bungalow built in 1926. It is architecturally significant as characteristic of this style and historically significant as physical evidence of life in 1920s Newtown.

INTACTNESS: Good, but the verandah in the angle has been infilled as a room.

**CONDITION:** Good, but damp has eroded the brickwork mortar and caused cracking in the former verandah balustrade.
