





DESCRIPTION

A gable-roofed shop, on the street-line, with an adjoining hip-roofed residence, set back behind a picket fence, garden and verandah in the angle. The gable has an elegant turned finial. There is an intact four-pane shop window with curved heads, supported by mouldings and a half-glazed door. There is a side gate and the shop has a rear gable extension with three side windows and with a further skillion beyond.

The c1870 shop was originally 3 metres deep. The gabled (3 room?) extension is late Victorian (c1885-1901). The house is roughly contemporary with this extension.





HISTORY

The earliest section may date from 1870 or earlier. In the 1870s and 1880s the building was occupied by John Young, postman 152. A blacksmith, Thomas Heal was the occupier in 1892 153, and two painters, Herbert Edward Pile and Joseph Robertson were occupants from the turn of the century until the end of World War I 154. The first rate book listing of a shop associated with a six roomed wooden cottage was in 1901 155. However, as the number of rooms and the valuations recorded in the rate books varied little from the 1870s until 1919, and as the early rate book descriptions were very brief, it is difficult to date exactly the evolution of this building. The Pile family owned the property from the 1870s until 1904 156, and Joseph Robertson, painter, was owner/occupier from 1907-1919 157.

As early as 1860-61 a John M. Fisher was recorded as the owner of four roomed house and kitchen in Latrobe Street (NAV 20 pounds) next to a similar house occupied by Andrew Shade 158. Fisher's house might have been the earliest section of 410 Latrobe Terrace 159. In 1868 a new owner was recorded for Fisher's house, Thomas Mallett 160, and in 1870 the owner was Robert Hutchin (or

Hutchins). At this date the dwelling was recorded as a six roomed wooden dwelling, NAV 20 pounds 161. A butcher, Isaac Clisby, was the occupier in 1871, which might suggest a butcher's shop on the site 162. James Pile's ownership of the six roomed wooden building in Latrobe Terrace, next to Mrs Shade's four roomed wooden building, dated from 1873 when John Young, postman was Pile's tenant 163 , just as he had been Robert Hutchin's tenant the year before. From the late 1880s James and James William Pile owned the six roomed wooden cottage in Latrobe Terrace and by 1895 also owned the 33 feet of vacant land adjacent 164.

By the turn of the century, when Herbert Ernest Pile, painter, was the occupier, the property was described as a six roomed wooden cottage and shop, the NAV however, did not alter until 1904 when it increased from 14 to 16 pounds 165. From 1907 until 1919 the wooden dwelling and shop on 66 feet of land at 410 Latrobe Terrace was owned and occupied by Joseph Robertson, painter. The valuation very gradually increased from sixteen to eighteen pounds 166.

From the 1920s until the middle 1930s 410 Latrobe Terrace, as it was numbered from c1911 (earlier numbering was 172), was owned by Kate Ekstedt of 62 Aberdeen Street, Geelong West. She let to Benjamin Lewis, tailor, in 1923; Hans Anderson, merchant, in 1925, and in the 1930s, to Cecil Stanford, labourer 167.

SIGNIFICANCE

Constructed in stages, possibly beginning in the 1860s, this building has regional historical significance as an early Victorian shop/residence with associations with Newtown craftsmen particularly Henry Ernest Pile, painter, whose family owned the structure from the 1870s - 1904, and with a second partner, Joseph Robertson, who was owner/occupier from 1907 - 1919. It is of regional architectural significance as a relatively intact early shop and residence surviving on an exposed site. Of further interest are the various additions to the early shop, illustrating the development of the owners' needs and use.
