BUILDING ADDRESS

100-100A PAKINGTON STREET.

HISTORY

This building was constructed about 1860, and in 1872 it was still the only two storey building between the old Telegraph Hotel and the old Queen of the South Hotel. Mr. George Wilson was the ratepayer from 1861 until at least 1872 and a bakery was part of the building. Bakeries were small local businesses generally within walking distance of residents. This bakery probably served the built up area between Preston and Waterloo Streets. The building has been occupied by the upholster, Perry, for many years.

DESCRIPTION

100-100A Pakington Street is a two storey building built to the site boundary with an angled corner. The walls are rendered with decorative ashlar coursing. The first floor windows and two windows on the ground floor have window enframements and sills made of sandstone. This decorative feature is enhanced by the attractive arrangement of the glazing bars. This form of glazing was rarely used in Geelong prior to the 1860's. Three quarters of the ground floor facade has been altered from the original. Along the south elevation there is a single storey extension. The hipped roof has relatively new corrugated iron cladding.

SIGNIFICANCE

This building at 100-100A Pakington Street is a significant two storey structure exhibiting early design origins such as the angled corner and decorative ashlar coursing and the original fine architectural window details rarely used in Geelong buildings prior to 1860. It is a tangible reminder of how a small business, such as a bakery, served the local population. It is a fregional significance.

POLICY/RECOMMENDATIONS

More sympathetic window and door joinery at ground level would greatly enhance this building, as would careful paint removal from the stonework,
